The Growing Up in Australia study has continued to be a significant resource for me in my work. Early on, I looked at mothers returning to work and breastfeeding, then childcare and fathering. As you have grown up, I have been able to look into the relationships between young adults and their parents and have explored topics to do with work and career aspirations. The study has allowed me to explore and publish on many aspects of family life.
